Dear Clover Hill,

Did you know that Darwin did not say the phrase, "survival of the fittest?"

I was listening to a conversation between Krista Tippett and Janine Benyus about Benyun's book, <u>Biomimicry: Innovation Inspired by Nature biomimicry</u>

this back and forth happened in the interview,

Tippett: Darwin didn't say "fittest," he said "fit."

Benyus: He said "fit." Herbert Spencer, who was a political scientist at that time [repurposed the phrase as "survival of the fittest."]

Tippett: But that is incredible. Let's stop and take that in because we built our entire society around "survival of the fittest."

Benyus: I know.. I know... He did not say that. He said, "survival of the fit." Which means: fit to place, fit to your community. Because he understood... that organisms don't just move into a place; they co-create a place and then the place creates them, and then they create the place."

Let me offer this illustration so we are on the same page. There is a reason we do not see palm trees in NJ. This place is not "fit" for them. This place instead is fit for lots of evergreens and maples, tomatoes and corn, and so much more. But not palm trees.

Now why am I writing about this?



I've been at Clover Hill for 15 months and I'm starting to see some of the natural things that can grow in our community of faith. (This picture shows what naturally grows in the "yard" of the parsonage.)

There is a group of folks at church that have been thinking about trying new things and imagining a new future for church gathering. But whatever we try in the future needs to be natural to the gifts and interests in the people within our community. It needs to fit where we are here and now.

This concept is developed in "natural church growth" but became more clear to me after hearing this interview.

Two things I hear, and you do too, all the time:

- 1. Well, we've always done it this way.
- 2. We really wish we had more members of our church.

If we were to look at those two statements through the lens of "what is fit?" here and now, I wonder what we would learn about our future as a church?

Can you think of gifts and interests within our community that would be a natural place of growth in our greater community?

Can you think of how CHRC might expand our ways of doing church by exploring gifts and ideas that we have not explored before?

We each have so much to offer when it comes to the future of our community of faith. We must, just like Benyus does, look at what is naturally growing. What is fit to grow in the soil of our community of faith?

Just as spring represents the birth of new animals and new plant life, we are hopeful that it is also the beginning of a new story for our church.



This month we would like to share the 2nd of the 7 C's for calling a part-time pastor from our team's guiding reference, 'The Calling of a Part-Time Pastor' by Warren Seibert.



2. Calling (pg. 84)

Your pastor should feel a calling to a part-time ministry. This is not something they are just doing because they can't find a full-time call. They know this is precisely what they are meant to do. They are even willing to work another job in order to be able to serve a smaller church that may not be able to afford to have a pastor with them otherwise.

Even more, they sense a calling to serve with your particular church in ministry. This is the people and place that your pastor believes would truly please God for him or her to serve among, using the gifts and training that God has provided to build up and equip the church for works of ministry. A search committee should hear a pastoral candidate articulate this sense of calling to serving as a bivocational pastor with a church like your church. It needs to be apparent that a particular candidate for your ministry is "all in" and is not just biding time with you, waiting for something else to open up or some other opportunity to come their way.

In the same way, the church must also understand that you are called to a ministry with a part-time pastor at this time in your church's history. The fact that Christ is calling a pastor to serve in your church is proof that God has good intentions for your church. That God has plans for your church. That perhaps the best years of your church may not be in the past, but just ahead, in ways you can't even imagine.

Summer Season Sunday School (SSSS) program June 4 through August 27, 2023



This year's SSSS Curriculum is called, 'This I Believe' and it focuses on teaching the Apostle's Creed. Much of the material comes from the book, 'Laying the Foundation: A Family Study of the Apostle's Creed' by Luke Wilkerson.

Christian faith practices like how to forgive, pray and tithe. Only in this way will they learn how to live as Christians in a world that is increasingly non-Christian. The Apostles' Creed is one of the oldest Christian creeds, confessed by believers as a summary of the faith for more than 1600 years. When Reformer Martin Luther was compiling his Small Catechism for Christian families, he included three essentials: the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, and the Apostles' Creed. Martin Luther said of the Apostles' Creed, "Christian truth could not possibly be put into a shorter and clearer statement." This summer we will be covering the basic beliefs found in the Apostles' Creed, the Belgic Confession and the Heidelberg Catechism.

As with past summers this year's SSSS will be a 'grab and go' format. That is, all materials will be provided so all the 'teacher' has to do is familiarize themselves with it beforehand and teach.



When I was a kid, the parish I belonged to was a rather big one. We were told it was comprised of approximately 10,000 families. On Sundays, we had 10 Masses. Yes, you read that correctly, ten. In some of the time slots there was a simultaneous Mass going on in the school gym with the so-called guitar Masses. When I became an altar server there were times I was scheduled to serve in the school. That was the first time I ever heard Sister Janet Mead's version of the Lord's prayer which one of the nuns played on bass guitar. However, I digress. My Dad, sisters and myself tended to go to the 11:00 Mass in the church building. That was the one that had the adult choir. I was always fascinated with the music they sang. It didn't sound like what we were singing in the pews. It had different voice parts and made for some interesting music. (Oh yes, there were some clunkers too. Every choir has its pieces that just don't sound as they ought.). By the time I was in high school my Dad and I didn't always go to the same Mass. On those occasions I discovered you could sit in the choir loft when there was no choir. I did that a number of times. One Sunday, the organist asked me to consider joining the choir. I was caught off guard but I thought about his request and decided to try it out. I was glad I did. It was a choir of about 15 people. I felt as though after that I got more involved in the life of the parish. When I was in college, I sang in the Campus ministry choir. After college I sang in a parish choir of about 60 people. That was a great experience. That same choir sang at my first Mass!

What's my point? Music can affect our lives in so many ways. I find more than anything it brings joy to people. When our choir and the Three Bridges choir sang together on Good Friday I was so filled with joy. We could take an ordinary song and with a little bit of effort make an amazing sound to give praise to our God and experience joy while either singing or listening to the song. Have you ever thought of the joy you could experience if you shared your talents, given to you by God, with the whole congregation? Think of the joy you could experience as well as the joy you could share.

Our choir generally sings from the Sunday after Labor Day until Pentecost. We meet at 9:00 on Sunday to rehearse and we sing during the 10:00 worship service. Consider this a personal invitation to join the choir.

Let us sing in faith and love of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!
