Dear Clover Hill,

Welcome to November! I once served a church where one woman kept an annual tradition of decorating the communion table on Thanksgiving Sunday with a cornucopia overflowing with squash and gourds and everything that represents the colors and tastes of the season.



One of the best-known histories of the cornucopia involves “the birth and nurturance of the infant Zeus, who had to be hidden from his devouring father Cronus. In a cave on Mount Ida on the island of Crete, baby Zeus was cared for and protected by a number of divine attendants, including the goat Amaltheia (“Nourishing Goddess”), who fed him with her milk. The suckling future king of the gods had unusual abilities and strength, and in playing with his nursemaid accidentally broke off one of her horns, which then had the divine power to provide unending nourishment, as the foster mother had to the god.”

It’s quite beautiful that from the scene in which an infant is in danger from his father who might eat him comes the divine power (and security) to provide all that is needed!

We don’t have to go to Greek mythology to trust that we will be provided for. We believe God is our provider. And everything belongs to God.

Psalm 50:10-11 says,

*Every animal of the forest is mine,
and the cattle on a thousand hills.
I know every bird in the mountains,
and the insects in the fields are mine.*

So often our mindset is one of scarcity rather than abundance. We worry about what we have or what we need. When we see war and violence, hatred and animosity in our world, we often fall into thinking that there will be winners and there will be losers. The world seems like a zero sum game, the pieces of the pie are finite. Once the pie is gone, that’s all there is.

That doesn’t work with our belief in a God to whom everything belongs.

During this month, we will have two opportunities to stretch our minds, to change our perspectives from scarcity to abundance.

The first is our stewardship campaign that began last Sunday. The theme this year is **Dream**. We want to dream together about what God is calling us to be and do in our corner of the world. *Please join us for brunch after worship on November 12 to dream together.*

The second is a conversation we are hosting to discuss “mutual expectations” when calling a part-time pastor. I hope you’ll join us after worship on November 19th to talk about this.

Both of these conversations begin by recognizing what we have and then daring to imagine what God sees possible in and through us.

As we go into this month, perhaps a “gratitude challenge” will help guide us from a place of scarcity to abundance. Download this [30 day gratitude challenge](#) if you’re up to it!



Message from the Pastoral Search Team

Search Team Update:

“For I know the plans I have for you,” declares the Lord, “plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.” Jeremiah 29:11

God sent this message, through the prophet Jeremiah, to the Israelites being held captive in Babylon. If we look at the verses in Jeremiah 29 prior to this verse we find Jeremiah telling the exiles that God wants them to settle into this land they’ve been exiled to, to seek peace and make a life for themselves and when the time is right, he will bring them home. But to be brought home, they need to seek out their God with all of their heart, and God will find them and restore them. But, before this will happen, Jeremiah tells them that they will struggle, that they will encounter hardships and that their time in exile will be long.

So, as we read this verse, we are reminded that our God is always in control, even when things seem to not be moving in the ‘right’ direction. That we are not promised an ‘easy’ time or that any tough times we are enduring will pass quickly. But we are promised, that when we seek God, he will bring us through and give us hope and a future.

We continue to ask for your prayers that we listen to where God is calling us in this Search. For prayers that the person that God is calling to serve as our pastor heeds that call. For prayers that our church continues to seek God's will and share His love with those around us.

Our thanks to everyone who participated in the October discussions on gender and sexuality. We hope that you will join us in the November congregational discussion about ‘mutual expectations’ between a pastor and a congregation.

Our Pastor Search Team is hosting a conversation about the "mutual expectations" between a church and their part-time pastor on November 19 after worship. Please join us!

The job of Pastor is not like a typical corporate 9-5 or an hourly job where one "clocks in." Besides the hours being different, the expectation of availability in the evenings and on the weekends are expected. What other things do we expect of our pastor?

And then let's consider the flipside - the role of a congregant is not the same as family or friend or neighbor. The intimacy and vulnerability shared between congregant and pastor is unique. There is an expectation to grow together as we worship and work. The pastor expects that congregants are growing, learning, searching and sharing. What else do you think Pastors expect of their congregation?

If we think about it, all relationships have mutual expectations. And often, when those expectations aren't met, relationships suffer. If we were calling a full-time pastor, it would still be helpful for us to talk about the expectations we have of a pastor. The truth is, the relationship between pastor and congregation requires work and this conversation is part of the work we can do now.

The 2024 Stewardship Campaign Has Begun!

The theme this year is “Be Thou My Vision, Oh Lord of My Heart.”

During the campaign this year, we are asking the question, “Where is God leading us?” We want to dream about the things we could do within the church and what we could do to make a difference in our world. When we gather at the potluck brunch after church on 11/12, we will brainstorm about some of these ideas. We hope you can make it - we promise the food will be good!

As always, your pledges continue to be a vital part of the church budgeting process. We will once again use these intentions of giving to build next year’s budget based on realistic expectations about our income. As the Pastoral Search team looks at candidates, our pledges will dictate what level of involvement we can afford in a new minister. Many thanks to the 27 households who made pledges for 2023 and for working towards fulfilling those pledges!

2024 Pledge cards were mailed out and you can send them back to the church, drop them off at the church, or send an email to chrcfinancialsecretary@gmail.com. As always, your pledges are strictly confidential. And we recognize that these are your best intentions, but stuff happens in life. Sometimes people will not be able to fulfill their pledges and sometimes people will be able to exceed their pledges.

Last year we began a plan to set aside 5% of the pledge dollars received each year to spend on outside mission projects. In 2023, that amount was \$5,444. Consistory approved supporting the following missions with that money: The Hillsborough Food Pantry, Samaritan Homeless Interim Program (S.H.I.P.), The Flemington Food Pantry, Safe in Hunterdon, Fisherman’s Mark, Good News Home for Women, and the CHRC Benevolence Fund (to help individuals in need).

Made For The Harvest, Jesus' Parables ([Mark 4:3-20](#))



Jesus used the Parable of the Sower (Parable of the Four Soils) to teach people that there are different ways we can approach spiritual growth, but there is only one way that will produce fruitful growth to a true, beautiful, and lasting spiritual journey with God.

The Parable of the Sower's message is that unless we nurture our relationship with God (the good soil), we won't grow into the faithful Christians He calls us to be.

When we feed our faith through God's Word and by seeking Him in earnest, our hearts and lives overflow with the abundance of God's grace.

Which Parable of the Four Soils are you like?

The seed represents the Word of God. What type of soil is in our hearts will determine whether the seed of God's Word, love, and grace will flourish within us or not.

1. Seed that fell on the path:

Do you pray from your heart or do you recite prayers from memory while your thoughts wander? Do you read the Bible? Do you reflect, learn, and grow from reading or does it feel empty?

2. Seed that fell on the rocky ground:

Do you make time for God in your busy schedule or do you give God time only if you have any left? Does your faith stand up to challenges and criticisms or does it crumble when tested by troubles or doubts? Do you go "all-in" for Jesus, then go for long periods where He's hardly a thought?

3. Seed that fell among thorns:

The Seed that fell among thorns is like wanting something very badly, but letting other things keep getting in the way of accomplishing it. Do you take an honest look at your faith and strive to grow closer to God or are you satisfied with your current relationship with Him? Do you strive to lead God's will for your life or do you get drawn away by worldly goals, like wealth, outward beauty, or status? Do you work on building your trust in God or do you get consumed by worldly worries?

4. Seed that fell on good soil:

The Seed that fell on good soil is like seeking Jesus with all your heart as He asked us:

You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart. Jeremiah 29:13

Good soil makes Jesus a priority. It means making time for Him, rather than trying to squeeze Him into your busy schedule. It means pursuing a personal relationship with Him as you would pursue a relationship – getting to know Him, speaking to Him often, trusting Him, making time for Him, and treating Him with love, kindness, and respect.

Seeking Jesus is an insatiable longing. The closer you get, the more you want to get even closer. This relationship spills over into the person you are, the way you treat others, and the way you live your life.

If you're not where you want to be spiritually, today is a fresh start to plant your seeds in good soil so you can strengthen your relationship with Jesus as God wants you to do. This is also known as God's Will – when you align your thoughts, words, and deeds to God's Word.

I think I need to get outside in the cool of autumn and weed some.

THE MEANING OF THE ADVENT WREATH

The Advent wreath symbolizes the never-ending love of God. There are typically four candles on the wreath.

WEEK 1 CANDLE



Prophecy Candle (purple)

This candle reminds us of the promises of Scripture to send a Savior. The many prophecies of the Old Testament teach us this truth! (Isaiah 9:6)

WEEK 2 CANDLE



Bethlehem Candle (purple)

This candle reminds us of the humble birth of Christ. It also reminds us to prepare our hearts for Jesus during the season! (Micah 5:2)

WEEK 3 CANDLE



Shepherds Candle (rose)

This candle reminds us that Christ came for all people. The shepherds were unnoticed by most of the world but God chose them to be the first to receive the good news! (Luke 2:8-9)

WEEK 4 CANDLE



Angels Candle (purple)

This candle reminds us of the good news that the angels announced--Emmanuel, God with us, has come! (Luke 2:13-15)

Some Advent wreaths also have a white Christ-candle, which reminds us of the purity of Jesus and is lit on Christmas Day!

A friend told me what happened at work recently when a co-worker told him and his coworkers all about a documentary he had seen about Jesus. According to the documentary, Jesus wasn't divine and He wasn't celibate. The Church and Constantine made it all up. I knew exactly what my friend should have done. God had turned a spotlight on him. He was in the hot seat. He should have witnessed. He should have defended Jesus' divinity in whatever way he knew how. He should have promised to look up the issues he didn't understand and provide answers later. "Wow!" I said. "So what did you do?" "I changed the subject," he said. Ouch. But understandable. This is a hard thing to do. But we have to learn to do it.

I would dare say that evangelization is a daily responsibility. There's a kind of preaching which falls to each of us as a daily responsibility, and before you ask, no, it's not just the job of Pastor Beth! It has to do with bringing the Gospel to the people we meet, whether they be our neighbors or complete strangers. I would say that this preaching I'm talking about is the informal preaching which takes place in the middle of a conversation and this can happen unexpectedly and in any place: on the street, in a mall, during work, or on a journey.

The first thing to do is listen. Good evangelization has to be a dialogue, the other person speaks and shares his or her joys, hopes, and concerns for loved ones, or so many other heartfelt needs.

I saw how powerful this is when I recently saw someone I barely knew and hadn't seen in years.

"I just have to thank you," he said. "You said something to me years ago that changed my life."

"That's great!" I said. "What did I say?" "You said, When you die, all you take with you is what you gave away to others." "I did?" I asked.

First of all, this is not an original piece of wisdom that I can bask in the glow of. It's great advice, but it's been said dozens of ways by countless people, not least in the New Testament (1 Tim 6:6). Second, it's not something I ever remember thinking, let alone saying to anybody.

But apparently, I did, and it hit home. The man told me why. "I was telling you about two career choices I had, but after you said that, I changed my plans."

I had listened, and cared - and the Holy Spirit did the rest.

After listening, bring up God's word, perhaps by reading a Bible verse or relating a story.

This is important. None of us is as smart as Scripture. I discover that over and over as I write homilies about the Sunday readings. Jesus goes places my mind never would.

When people have questions, go to Scripture for answers. You don't need to know much. For instance, it's surprising how many issues the Beatitudes apply to. If you can flesh out the lesson with a personal story, better still.

If it seems prudent and if the circumstances are right, this fraternal and missionary encounter could end with a brief prayer related to the concerns which the person may have expressed.

This is a gutsy move, for sure. But it's also the kind of thing that seems less weird the more you try it.

Praying with somebody does three things. First, it demonstrates your concern - you don't want to win an argument; you want them to be healed and happy. Second, it teaches the person what prayer looks like. Many people you meet might have never heard someone pray. Third, of course, it brings God right down into your midst.

You may not be a theologian or an expert in apologetics. It doesn't matter. Anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love doesn't need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love.

You don't need to understand the intricacies of the Church to evangelize, any more than you need to know the restaurant industry to recommend your favorite restaurant.

When it comes to following Jesus it's usually not more information that we need, but more guts.

Speaking of guts, do you have the guts to get out of your comfort zone and sing with the choir? We meet on Sundays at 9:00 AM and sing at 10:00 Worship. Come join us.




His name is Jonas, and he especially touched the project leader’s (Andy’s) heart. Andy was **deeply encouraged by Jonas’ entrepreneurship, positive attitude, and stamina to overcome the incredible odds evident in his life with living in a country that provides little to no assistance to people who are handicapped.** After purchasing several of his crafts Jonas said, “I want to give you a gift.” He asked Andy to select one of his smaller toys. Andy’s heart was deeply moved by this remarkable act of generosity. Jonas’ kindness, generosity, and inner drive helped us regain a perspective that some of us had lost sight of.

Helping During Political Instability



EMI felt a little apprehensive about the political instability in Burkina Faso before the trip. Most people will not visit the country because of this reality. However, the Sisters of Holy Cross commented several times how thankful they were for EMI’s willingness to come and serve them.



As you can imagine, the political instability is a great discouragement for the people, and it is **easy to wonder if this hospital project would be destroyed, stalled or stopped by terrorist activity.** Was it worth EMI’s time and effort?

The Design Team

EMI kept the design team small for this project to avoid attracting unwanted attention, even though the project was very demanding. The complexity of designing a hospital from scratch proved challenging, however God's hand was on the team. **Collectively, the multinational team represented Burkina Faso, Chad, Senegal and the US.** The whole team, including the Sisters, the translator, the architects, and the EMI team, felt the fatigue and obstacles of the language and cultural barriers.

The Sisters depended on the team to provide direction for the design, and yet the desire was for them to express their ideas, vision, hopes, and dreams for this design. The inception of this hospital is important to many people, and the project has many engaged investors. Please continue to pray for this hospital project, and specifically pray for the discovery of a water source.

The Sisters' faith in God and hope for their community was an encouragement. One evening before dinner, a group of us were discussing an African soccer game being broadcast on the television. The Sisters said, "How great it would be if the crowds in the stadium knew Jesus!" The joy of the Lord and His Spirit of peace is evident. It is a reminder to pray for this hospital to be a place where multitudes give their lives to Jesus.


