John 21:3

The Gospel according to John was finished. The end of the 20th chapter clearly is a wrap up: "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing, you may have life in his name." And then the Gospel continues. A 21st chapter is added. Why? We may speculate that this final story had been forgotten, but could not be left out.

And what happens in this last chapter? It is after Easter, after the resurrection, after Jesus's appearance with his disciples. What to do now? Simon Peter had an answer. "I am going fishing." It was what they did; it was who they were. They returned to what they knew. And there, they encountered Jesus.

It is easy to see the parallels for our journey. As we move past our observances of Holy Week, past the celebration of Easter, where do we go as individuals? As we move past the end of Pastor Beth's transitional ministry with us, where do we go as a church? The answer is simple. We continue to do what we do. We continue to be who we are. And we look for Jesus, joining us where we are--in the ordinary busy-ness of our lives and in the ongoing worship and work of the church. Like the disciples, we may fail to recognize Him at first. But if we allow ourselves to see with the eyes of faith, with the eyes of the heart, we will know that He is there, directing us, challenging us to trust and cast the nets again.

## **Covenant of Closure**

Upon her arrival in Clover Hill, when asked how she preferred to be addressed, Pastor Beth responded that "reverend is a title; pastor is a relationship." Over the course of more than two years, we have lived in this relationship together. We have prayed together, worshipped together, celebrated together, mourned together, talked, discussed, disagreed, shared. And while this relationship has been of relatively short duration, life has happened during our time together and a pastoral bond has been formed.

At our March meeting, the members of Consistory discussed and agreed to enter into a Covenant of Closure with Pastor Beth. We are grateful for the participation of the Rev. Dawn Alpaugh, our Classis minister, in this conversation. She helped us to understand why this Covenant is necessary and required by the Classis at the end of a pastorate. It is precisely because of the sacred and personal role of the pastor in the life of a congregation and its members that the Covenant is entered into. The stated purposes of the Covenant of Closure are to provide for a grace-filled dissolution of the pastoral relationship and to promote the formation of healthy, new pastoral relationships.

Under this Covenant, Pastor Beth agrees that, with the exception of specific commitments she has made and will honor, she will no longer be providing pastoral services to Clover Hill or its members. If there are to be any additional exceptions for which Pastor Beth is asked to provide pastoral services of any kind for anyone who is a part of the Clover Hill family, these will be handled through consultation with the new pastor, if one is in place, or the Consistory or the Classis minister, as appropriate.

This pastoral relationship, now ending, has been a blessing. We join in asking for God's blessings on Pastor Beth's ministry and on the ministry of the Clover Hill Reformed Church as we come to the end of our journey together.

# Message from the Pastoral Search Team

## **Search Team Update:**

This last month has given us opportunities as well as setbacks with so many obligations with us journeying through Lent and Holy Week. That offered the team more options to see one of our candidates' preach in person at various venues. The candidates' calendars are also very full with preaching obligations and wrapping up their semester at seminary. We are feeling very positive and praying for God's guidance as we move forward.

Our focus is on number 7 of the "Seven C's" from the book "The Calling of a Part-Time Pastor is Compensation (pg. 89-90)

## Compensation

The main idea here is to be honest, fair, and creative. This pertains to the church and to the pastor. Don't make it a negotiation between two competing parties; instead make it an exploration of the best way to enter into a partnership in the gospel together for the benefit of the church. What does this look like? Basically, you all sit down together to come up (with) what is mutually beneficial. Remember, the part-time pastor has already agreed not be be fully compensated by the church, has already committed to working another job to serve your church, and has already relinquished many benefits of serving in a fully-funded ministry (like more time for sermon preparation, more days for visitation, more opportunities to attend conferences and church events, more flexibility in scheduling, and the like). In other words, this pastor has already demonstrated their dedication to serving as a partner in the gospel with you.

You can show your dedication to serving in partnership in the gospel with them by representing the financial position of the church with integrity.

Another way to show your dedication is to offer what is right, financially speaking, for the amount of ministry you expect of them. If you really expect your pastor to serve in a 'full-time' role in terms of hours per week, but you are only offering them compensation equal to 'half-time' in terms of hours per week, you (are) being dishonest and unfair. . . . This, as you can imagine, is a recipe for disaster.

Here is where creativity must come in. Perhaps you plan on calling a part-time pastor for '1/2' time. Yet your church cannot afford what is required for this. There are other benefits you can offer, rather than money. There may be a parsonage that can be used by the pastor. If the pastor will reside in the parsonage with full utilities paid by the church, but is only going to be '1/2' time, you are already providing a substantial benefit to the pastor. Therefore, the pastor may agree to the salary portion of the compensation being less than usual for '1/2' time. Think also about a pastor who makes a good living at their other job. Maybe being offered more money will not appeal to them as much as being offered more weeks off for vacation or continuing education.

## Ten Ways to Love Like God Loves

#### **1 CORINTHIANS 13**

We talk a lot about love but know less about it today than any generation since the time of Christ. It's amazing how the word "love" can be misused.

Many think love is just a feeling—oceans of emotions. We get confused because English has only one word for love. But there are several kinds of love, and Scripture uses a different Greek word for each kind.

Eros is romantic love between a man and a woman.

Phileo is the brotherly love we feel for friends and companions.

Storge is the love family members have for each other.

But agape(pronounced "ah-gah'-pay") is God's love—the love He extends to everyone.

Love may contain feelings. But God's love isn't an emotion because the Bible commands us to love, and you cannot command an emotion. Think about it.

We cannot *phileo* or *storge* the world because those types of love involve feelings and emotions. But *agape* isn't something you feel—it's something you <u>do</u>. Agape is the love God commands us to give. Agapeis results in action, not feelings. It's listed first in the fruit of the Spirit (<u>Galatians 5:22</u>). We can *agape* even those we don't like, because to *agape* is a choice.

What is God's *agape* love like? <u>First Corinthians 13</u> perfectly summarizes ten aspects of it. Let's do a little fruit inspecting.

Are these ten qualities in your heart?



#### **STEADFAST**

God's *agape* love is longsuffering. If you're impatient, then you're unlike the Lord Jesus. "... having loved His own, He loved them unto the end" (<u>John 13:1</u>). Agape is longsuffering; it forgives 70 times 7, and then keeps right on.

#### **SERVING**

Agape love doesn't give what others deserve, but what they need. If someone has wronged you, find a way to be kind. You say, "They don't deserve it." That's right. Agape serves those who don't deserve it. Do good, speak well, pray hard for your enemies.

#### SINCERE

Agaperejoices when another is blessed. If I say I love you but cringe when you're praised, if I think your gain is my loss, I don't sincerely love you.

#### **SELF-EFFACING**

Agape is humble. It doesn't swagger. Pride and love do not dwell in the same heart. If you're filled with egotism and pride, you're hard to be around. You're argumentative. "Only by pride comes contention" (Pro. 13:10). Any contention in your home? The problem in our homes is ego against ego, self-love against self-love. Agape quells your pride.

#### **SELF-RESTRAINING**

Agape is courteous. A rude person is so unlike Jesus, who was meek and gentle, putting others first. Agape loves in little things. If you don't love in little things, you won't love in big things.

#### **SELF-DENYING**

Agape doesn't say, "Me first," or "I know my rights." When you were saved, you were crucified with Christ. You're not your own; you're bought with a price, and He has commanded you to love. When we stop thinking about our rights and seek to bless others, our world will change.

#### **SERENE**

Agape is not easily provoked. If you want to know what you're full of, just see what spills out when you're jostled. If you quickly explode, the love of Jesus is missing within.

### **SACRIFICIAL**

There's no forgiveness without someone paying a price. If you owe me \$10 and I forgive it, it costs me \$10, doesn't it? Bury past hurts in the grave of God's forgetfulness. It costs to forgive.

## **SYMPATHETIC**

Agape love doesn't rejoice when someone falls. It weeps. When you hear of someone's hurt or failure, you're heartbroken over sin.

## And the Tenth Way to Love Like God Loves

#### **SUFFERING**

Agape is sacrificial. It's the love that, choosing to love, also chooses to suffer. When you love someone, you risk that they may hurt and disappoint you. You cannot love without suffering. It "beareth all things."

How did you do on these qualities? Examine your heart and ask: "Is this true in of me?"

The New English Bible puts it this way: "There is nothing love cannot face. There is no limit to its faith." There's a burden to bear when you love like God loves. His *agape love* bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Agape is the love our world needs. My friend, that's the fruit of the Spirit. Do you find that you have work to do on your list? If so, then talk to the Lord about it. (Article from Love Worth Finding Ministries)

St. Augustine of Hippo said that "We are an Easter people and 'Alleluia' is our song!" And because of this, we celebrate not just the day of Easter but a whole 50-day season of Easter. Easter is a big deal. Without Easter there would be no Christianity. With Easter we celebrate the hope Jesus' Resurrection gives us. May we enjoy this season to the fullest!

Now maybe you're looking at what I wrote and are thinking to yourself, "50 days? That's a long time!" I agree, it is a lot of time. Longer than the 12 days of Christmas! And of course, it ought to be longer than the 12 days of Christmas, because the resurrection of Jesus Christ is the cornerstone of our faith as Christians. So why wouldn't we celebrate that for a significant amount of time? After all, Easter is not only the greatest Christian feast; Easter Sunday symbolizes the fulfillment of our faith as Christians. Through His Death, Christ destroyed our bondage to sin; through His Resurrection, He brought us the promise of new life, both in Heaven and on earth.

How do we make the season of Easter a celebration? Well, in the church building it's a bit easier. We use white on all the Sundays until Pentecost, the last day of Easter, when we use red. Generally, we don't read from the Hebrew scriptures during Easter but rather from the Acts of the Apostles each Sunday of the Easter season according to the Revised Common Lectionary. Of course, we also reintro-

duce the use of Alleluia in our songs and prayers.

What about in our everyday lives? That's a little tougher isn't it. I have a couple of ideas. I'm sure my ideas are not exhaustive. If you have some other ideas share them!

A couple thoughts: Read the Easter passages of the Bible as you have time during the Easter Season. Matthew 27:62-28:20; Mark 15:42-16:20; Luke 23:50-24:53; John 19:38-21:25 and Acts 1:1 to 3:26.

Spread Easter joy. Get yourself in the Easter mood and others too, by sending out Easter cards this Easter season. This is an easy way to remind friends that Easter is an entire season, not just a single day!

Decorate your house with symbols of vibrant life and fruitfulness.

Spring and the Resurrection go together! Fill your house with the lovely fragrance of fresh flowers in honor of the Resurrection of Jesus and a sign of hope in our own resurrection. You can also decorate your home by draping white sashes on all your crosses, thus reminding your family that the joy of this season goes beyond Easter Sunday.

The fifty days between Easter Sunday and Pentecost Sunday is a great time to pray for the Holy Spirit to fill and transform your life, just as the Holy Spirit did for the Apostles when they were living in fear in the Upper Room.

Of course, you could celebrate the joy of Easter by giving the choir a try. No commitment for trying or not being able to commit to every Sunday. Pray about it!




## Palm Sunday March 24, 2024

A few times each year, we like to remind everyone about some of the non-traditional ways to make gifts to the church.

Here are a few things to consider:

## CHECK WITH YOUR EMPLOYER TO SEE IF THEY HAVE A MATCHING GIFT PROGRAM:

Over 26 million individuals work for a company that offers a matching gift program, but many are not aware of it. There are numerous companies that will match an employee's donation to a charity (usually up to a certain limit). This could DOUBLE what you donate to the church without costing you anything! Ask your HR department if such a program is available. If the church needs to register, let us know. We are already registered with a few matching setups such as Benevity and Blackbard Giving.

## SET UP AN IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (QCD):

This is an IRA withdrawal that is paid directly from your IRA to a qualifying charity (such as the church). You must be aged at least 70 1/2 and the IRS has other qualifications to be met, but you may be able to eliminate the need to pay income tax on this donation. But remember, if you don't pay income tax on this donation, you will not be able to count it towards your charitable donation deduction on your taxes. Check with your tax advisor for guidance.

## **DONATE STOCKS OR OTHER SECURITIES:**

You can donate stocks and other securities directly to the church through our brokerage account. Consult with your tax advisor, as you may be able to benefit from a tax savings by donating highly appreciated stocks or bonds. Contact the church office for brokerage account information: 908-369-8451 or CHRC1834@gmail.com.

## **AUTOMATIC BILL PAY:**

This has become a very popular option. It is easy, just contact your bank to set up an online bill pay option. Set it up once and the bank will automatically withdraw the chosen amount from your account and mail a check to the church at whatever interval you want—monthly, weekly, etc.

## **PAYPAL GIVING FUND:**

This is a great option for someone who wants to use their credit card to make a donation. Just search online for "PayPal Giving Fund" and select Clover Hill Reformed Church or The Reformed Dutch Church of Clover Hill as the charity you want to support. Choose the amount you want to donate through your PayPal account. Please be aware that your donation will be anonymous to the church from PayPal and so you will NOT get a receipt from the church, but you will get one from PayPal.

## **DON'T FORGET ABOUT SHOPRITE GIFT CARDS!**:

If you buy ShopRite gift cards through the church, you get the full value of the gift card and the church gets 5% of the value on the gift card. That's a great return on your investment! ## The Light Still Shines - Steeple Lighting Progress Report

The Property Team has been steadily replacing the decades-old steeple lights with new, commercial grade LED lighting fixtures. The new lights, which replace old, problematic halogen fixtures are much brighter, cost effective and have a longer lifespan than those that they replace. These fixtures are a gift to the church from a donation we received. We are very grateful for this gift and equally as excited to see the results come to light!

To date, 5 of the 8 fixtures have been replaced and as you can see by the pictures the results are impressive. It takes approximately 2 hours to replace each fixture, so we have some more work ahead of us. We will report back later when the last fixture is replaced.

Until then, be assured that 'The Light Still Shines' at Clover Hill!!





## Loneliness

"But a time is coming, and has come when you will be scattered, each to his own home. You will leave me all alone. Yet I am not alone, for my Father is with me."

John 16:32 (NIV)

When I googled "loneliness" I found a lot of articles about the different types of loneliness, the causes and health consequences of loneliness, how to overcome and cope with loneliness and the list goes on and on. The one thing that is a constant theme throughout these articles is how prevalent it is now and even described it as an epidemic. It is affecting people of all ages, especially now on college campuses. Too many Americans feel lonely and isolated- but simple actions to strengthen our relationships can help.

In December 2023, United States Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy launched a national connection challenge to encourage people to prioritize relationships: the "5-for-5 Connection Challenge:'. The challenge entails taking simple but powerful actions to build and strengthen relationships and incorporate these connections on a daily basis.

The challenge is to "take 5 actions over 5 days that express gratitude to, offer support to, or ask for help from people in our lives. These simple but powerful types of actions can foster better social connection, which is associated with improved heart and brain health, protection against depression and anxiety, and even lowered risk of premature death." This is one way to combat loneliness. There are many other ways too. The bottom line is to be present and involved with the people around you.

So, I challenge you today to take the 5-for-5 Connection Challenge. And in five days check in with your-self to see if you feel differently. Did you make a new friend? Meet your neighbor? Feel happier?


