Dear Clover Hill,



If you can believe it, we are two weeks away from Ash Wednesday - oh, and also Valentine's Day.

Our sister churches, Three Bridges and Neshanic Reformed are collaborating with us again for our special services. Ash Wednesday (2/14) will be at Neshanic Reformed. We will be hosting Maundy Thursday (3/28). Three Bridges will be hosting Good Friday (3/29). Go ahead and put them on your calendars now!

There are three things I want to highlight about the Lenten season. (But keep reading this Belltower - there is more from the Spiritual Growth team.)

Hymns of the Faith sermon series - Each week of Lent, I will be highlighting a hymn in my sermon. I'll talk about the meaning of the lyrics, the theology that it draws from and delve into its origin story (why did the author/ musician write the hymn?)

Conversation about the Creeds - After worship each week of Lent, we'll gather in the Nevius Fellowship Hall to discuss one of the creeds held by the RCA, our denomination. Each of these creeds carry important historical context as well as specific questions or issues that the church was trying to iron out. You know how they say "all politics is local" well, "all theology is local" too. I hope you'll join us for these discussions.

Daily Devotional for Lent - Each year we provide at least one resource for daily meditation during the season of Lent. This year, the devotional material will come from the newest statement of faith of the RCA called the Song of Hope. It will be coming to your inbox soon!

For me, Lent is about carving out a particular period of time to engage my spiritual life. I tried to teach my kids to tend to their spiritual life. I reminded them that they have a physical life that needs tending, an emotional life that needs tending - and their spiritual life is no different. I would say, "please don't ignore your spiritual life." I'd like to say the same to you. Please don't ignore your spiritual life. We can tend to ours together this Lent.

Budget Presentation

At the January Consistory meeting, the 2024 budget was approved and **the Stewardship Team will present the budget and the results of the pledge drive to the congregation at coffee hour on February 4.** Please join us for some food and fellowship after worship that day!

On the next page is a copy of the pledge summary and our year-end cash position. On the following page is a copy of the simplified budget. If you would like to see the longer, more detailed copy of the budget, please contact the church office and we can email that to you.

2024 Denominational Assessment

Each year we have to pay an assessment to the Reformed Church Classis of Delaware-Raritan. **The cost for us in 2024 is \$100 per church member** (that is \$7100 for the entire year for all of our members). What is this money used for? It covers the small overhead of the Classis, and helps with things like the loans to Classis churches, minister support, and some mission work. Some church members choose to make a special offering to cover the cost of their assessment. Over the last three years, Clover Hill has received both pastoral and administrative support from the Classis.

Classis has been subsidizing the cost from member churches for a number of years and they now would like to move toward having churches cover the true cost of their expenses. The per member cost to Classis is currently \$149 per member! Consequently, we can expect that there will be increases over the next few years as they gradually bring up the amounts paid by the member churches to fully cover their budget.

The cost of the denominational assessment is a large expense for our church (the largest expense after salaries and building maintenance). In the past, many church members chose to make an annual gift to cover the cost of their denominational assessment. If you would like to do so, just note "assessment" on the memo line of your check and Thank You! If you cannot afford the full \$100 per member, you might consider making a smaller donation to help defray the cost, or even make quarterly assessment gifts of \$25.

2024 Operating Budget

2023 Notes:

- Attributable and Non-Attributable giving were down by over \$5000 in 2023.
- In 2023, we received \$117,023 of Memorial Gifts! This money does not go into the budget since these are all one time gifts. However, this money does go into our savings. Our savings will help sustain us as we work through this transitional period.
- In 2023, we earned \$6794 on our savings with the help of higher interest rates and the CD ladder that was created.

2024 Notes:

- Giving is forecasted to be much lower, based on the pledges that were received at the end of last year.
- Our interest income will be higher, based on having a full year of CD income.
- We are expecting a very large deficit.

Search Team Update:

As the search team moves into February, we will continue the process of reading resumes, developing questions for candidates and the interviews. Each month, in the Belltower, we reference for you something from the book, 'The Calling of a Part-Time Pastor'. This month we reference 'Cooperation'. We know as a team we must work together by combining our efforts toward our goal.

We ask for your continued prayers and support for our team, our church, and our leaders as we navigate this time together.

"Cooperation" (Pg.86-87, 'The Calling of a Part- Time Pastor,' by Warren Seibert)

Every church has a full-time ministry, and then some. This means that your pastor and every member of your church must each do their part. For a church that has a part-time pastor, this is even more urgent and essential. Leaders especially, meaning elders and deacons, have to step up to the plate and assume their biblical roles and responsibilities.

Collaboration will be the key to being a strong church. You will serve together well to the extent that ministry will be shared according to every person's calling when everyone in leadership acknowledges the God -given position of everyone else as an atmosphere of mutual respect and humility governs all leadership meetings, as a culture of honest and open communication is expected between your pastor and other leaders, and when service in the name of the Lord is encouraged for every member of your church. In other words, we as leaders, and as Christians, should conduct ourselves in manner worthy of the gospel of Jesus Christ (Phil 1:27). In this way, "the priesthood of all believers" will be built up in your church.

In addition, even before a new pastor arrives, the other leaders of the church need to decide to what extent they will honor the person they call as the "pastor" of the church. And they will need to decide to what extent they will allow the person they call as their pastor to "lead" with them. Do they want a true shepherd of God, or do they merely want someone to perform the duties they assign to them without input or question? Will the pastor be given a voice in deliberations? A say in decision-making? A place at the table? I would also advise that, when interviewing pastoral candidates, the church discovers that potential pastor's leadership style and their acceptance of the leadership of others. Do they accept the "priesthood of all believers" as a biblical characteristic of Christ's church?

Loving Your Enemies ??

The month of February contains a specific day when many express love to those we hold close in our hearts . It's a time for cards and gifts and open expressions of appreciation and love. Some may feel comfortable opening up to others and some may be timid or refrain altogether. It's a very individual thing, that expression of love.

1 Peter 4:8 Above all, keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins.

1 John 4 4:19 We love because He first loved us.

Many have someone in their lives who is difficult to love. God commands us to "love your neighbor as yourself". It's not easy to love someone who has hurt us. It isn't easy to let go of resentment. When we look to the Bible, however, there are verses that talk about loving your enemies.

Matthew 5:44 "But I say to you, Love your enemies, do good to those who persecute you.

Lent 2024: Rooted in God's Love

go Loved +

Lent starts this year on Valentine's Day, February 14th. Though Valentine's Day isn't a religious holiday, the convergence is significant. Lent is a time of dedication to the Lord. What does it mean to anchor yourself in love and in God this Lent? As we think of lenten discipline we might naturally associate it with shadows, emptiness, and suffering. Yes, these are elements of the lenten journey, to be sure, but so is love. How will you take on a lenten practice that is rooted in love this year? Here are three ideas for you.

Lovingkindness Meditation - You can do a simple search to find many scripts for this, but the basic idea is to think warmly first toward yourself, then toward someone you love, and finally toward an enemy. A few minutes per day makes a significant difference.

Practicing Self-Compassion - Every morning say to yourself "I am God's beloved child. God loves me unconditionally." — Sounds simple, but how often do we neglect to extend love and hospitality to ourselves? Children seem to be better at this, though they too can struggle. If we are to remind them of their worth, we must see it in ourselves first.

Scripture Memorization - Many of us know the beautiful and familiar words of 1 Corinthians 13 that begins "Love is patient. Love is kind." This love is not referring, specifically, to romantic love, but rather God's perfect love. Perhaps you'll want to memorize the whole chapter this Lent? How would that change your spiritual practice?

Strengthen your family's Christian faith with this fun and engaging Lenten Journey Calendar Bundle distributed during CHRC worship service in February to Sunday School families. This calendar is a good way to count down the days of Lent with even your youngest children. (Please contact the church office for a packet).

This resource helps your children understand the true meaning of Lent and why the daily practices of prayer and sacrifice are important for us as Christians. As part of a

Bible-believing congregation, we embrace the traditions of Lent because we recognize that we are all in need of seasons of deeper repentance and reflection. Lent helps our family to understand not only our sins but also Jesus' deep love for us and His sacrifice for our sins on the cross. It leads us to have greater joy in the Resurrection. One caution: Lent is not about "walking with Jesus" in the sense that we are capable of being like Him. The Christian life is more about "following Jesus" because though we are always striving to have more of Him and less of ourselves on display, we are never capable of being perfect as He is.

The calendar begins on Ash Wednesday and goes through Holy Week. It ends with Resurrection Sunday denoted on the bottom of the calendar. It is undated, so you can use it for any year. But if you're looking for specifics, this season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024. There are 40 days of Lent, but 46 days to color in on the calendar (including coloring in the letters for Resurrection Sunday at the bottom). Why? Because traditionally, Sundays do not count toward the number of days of Lent. For each day, there are simple activities to help us focus our hearts and minds on God's world, on Jesus and on others around us.

The calendar involves daily activities that deepen our faith and our appreciation for Jesus our Savior. Below are links for resources and instructions for some calendar activities:

 - 1 package yeast (.25 oz)
 - 1 1/2 cups warm water
 - 1 tablespoon sugar
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 4 cups flour
 - 1 egg
 - Large pretzel salt for the topping

Directions: Mix your yeast, water, sugar, and salt in a large bowl. Stir in the flour, and knead until the dough is smooth. Shape into the form of arms crossed in prayer and place it on a baking sheet. Brush the dough with a beaten egg to give it a shiny finish. Sprinkle the top with large pretzel salt. Bake in an oven preheated to 425 degrees for 15 minutes.



Creeds and Confessions: CHRC Adult Education Series during Lent 2024



Sundays during Lent following worship; led by Pastor Beth Dates: February 18, 25, March 3, 10, 17, 24 Explore the multiple creeds and their meanings



The Reformed Church in America (RCA) is a confessional church.

This means that, as a denomination, we affirm specific statements of belief called creeds and confessions. These statements are biblically based and were written to respond to issues by explaining in detail what the church believes about those topics.

During Lent, we'll explore the theologies and histories of the:

Nicene Creed - the nature of Jesus

Athanasian Creeds - our understanding of the Trinity

Heidelberg Confession - how we teach our beliefs

Belgic Confession - a thorough expression of the Protestant faith



Do you remember the movie *Moonstruck*? It's the story about an Italian family in Brooklyn; a mother named Rose, a father named Cosmo, and their daughter, Loretta, played by Cher.

There's a part where, Rose, who suspects her husband of cheating, says, "Cosmo, I just want you to know that no matter what you do, you're gonna die, just like everyone else!" And so are we. We're going to die. And no matter how well you think you're doing, you're screwing up, and I don't need to tell you where you're screwing up because you already know where you're screwing up.

In the movie Cher meets an operatic, over-emotional baker, her fiance's brother, and they yell and throw furniture, and then they cheat on her fiance and spend the night together. In the morning, Cher regrets her behavior, declaring, "Bad luck! Is that all I'm ever going to have? I should have taken a rock and killed myself years ago!" But her sense of desolation, and what she calls "bad luck," are both directly related to the choices she's made in her life.

Still, Cher is a little better off than the emoting baker. At least she has a sense that she's getting things wrong. The baker, on the other hand, is completely enthralled to his sentiments, and in what he believes they entitle him. He lives in a haze of feelings, and objects to Cher's remorse, because, get this, she's making him "feel guilty" about sleeping with his brother's intended wife.

Then one of my favorite parts of the movie happens: he says, "I'm in love with you" and Cher gives him a good rap across the face, twice, and says, "Snap out of it!"

How about you? What feelings, what enthrallments are you all wrapped up in to the point where you feel entitled to something? To the point where you can't even see what the people around you are going through or might need from you? Maybe someone is anxious and needs a good word from you, and you're not hearing it. Maybe someone just needs to hear a "Thank you" from you, or a word of praise, a little tenderness in a hard, stressful world. Maybe they need to see you seeing them. And maybe you need to see them loving you in return. Maybe they need you to pray for them, or better yet, to pray with them.

So, snap out of it. Feelings are good things, but if you over-entertain them, they become like quicksand, and you end up drowning in your own self. And that's a very lonely thing, because it means you've lost sight of God!

Ashes on the forehead. Getting smudged. It's a primitive, tribal thing; it marks us as belonging to the Tribe of Christ Jesus. It harkens back to ancient penitential practices and is also an outward sign of all we will become, whether we're monarchs or eccentrics: ashes.

There's another scene in *Moonstruck* where Cher goes to Confession and the priest says, "Reflect on your life." That's good advice. Think about this: What are you going to do between the time you get these ashes smudged on your forehead and you actually become them?

Reflect on your life. Get moving on the things you need to fix. You feed your family, you feed yourself, don't forget to feed your spirit.

If we're doing this Christian thing right, these ashes should also say that we are dead to the world but alive in Christ Jesus.

You can't sing? You don't like to commit to something each week? Snap out of it! God has given us each a voice. Whatever God gives us is what we give back. If God gave you a bad singing voice, then I guess God deserves to hear that gift returned! We meet each Sunday at 9:00 to rehearse and then sing at Sunday worship. Join us even if you are unable to make it a weekly commitment. We'd love your encouragement to keep giving God the glory in song.


