

News from the Spiritual Growth Team

Epiphany is a celebration of the arrival of wise men, also called magi, from the East who brought gifts to Jesus.



In spiritual terms, the word "epiphany" means an appearance or manifestation, especially of a divine being. In everyday life, we use the word "epiphany" to mean a moment when you had a sudden understanding. Think of this as those light-bulb moments when you get clarity or wisdom about a situation.

For many Christians, Epiphany marks the end of the Christmas season. Epiphany is on January 6, after the 12 days of **Christmas.** Epiphany is also called Three Kings Day. While tradition holds that three kings came to visit Baby Jesus in the stable (and the kings are even given the names of Melchior, Caspar, and Balthazar), the truth is probably quite different. The wise men brought three gifts to Jesus which has led to the assumption that there were only three wise men, but in reality it was probably a larger group. Another false assumption, made more popular by nativity sets everywhere, is that the wise men came to the stable the night Jesus was born. In reality, the visit of the wise men most likely occurred later, at least 40 days after Jesus' birth and possibly up to 2 years later. These men were traveling 800-900 miles to see Jesus, a long distance for that period of time. Likely the visit occurred six months to a year after Jesus' birth. Scripture

tells us that a star led these wise men to Jesus. Today we refer to this as the Star of Bethlehem. On the night Jesus was born, a bright star shone above where Jesus was located.

These men were not technically "kings" as we often refer to them. They were priests and scholars. The term "magi" gives us information about the wise men. The Greek word used here refers to scholars likely from Persia in the specific priestly caste of Zoroastrianism. These scholars were astrologers, so it makes sense that they would have seen the miracle of the star above the place where Jesus was born.

Herod played an important role in this situation, too. This is Herod the Great, who ruled from 37 B.C. to 4 B.C. Studies of Herod show that he was a ruthless and paranoid tyrant. When the magi came to him inquiring of the child, Herod panicked. He ordered that all baby boys under the age of two be killed because he saw any future king as a threat.

The gifts brought by the wise men were expensive and significant gifts, gold, frankincense, and myrrh, and they bowed down and worshiped Jesus. Matthew is the only one of the four gospels to include this aspect of the Nativity. <u>Matthew 2:1-12</u>



We've turned another page in the calendar and have begun 2024! Thinking about this season of Christmas, which we're still in, I've been thinking about the story we heard on Christmas Eve of the shepherds visiting when Jesus was born. One verse stands out to me: Luke 2:19 We read: And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart.

I dare say, not just Mary, but all mothers do this: they store up memories of their children: to keep them, hold on to them, to treasure them. And not just mothers, but all of us do this. We all keep memories in our hearts, continuing to reflect on them as months and years and decades pass by.

I'm wondering in this New Year what memories of 2023 you and I are keeping, storing, holding in our hearts?

Was 2023 a good year or a hard year or both? Was it a happy year, a sad year, or both? Was it a healthy year, a year of sickness or some of each? Was it a year of gain or a year of loss? Was it a year of pain or a year of peace? Or was it all of the above? Did the year just seem to fly by or did it creep at a snail's pace?

My physical heart has only four chambers, but my soul's heart has many more than four. What memories of 2023 are we holding in our hearts? Am I holding on to some hurtful memories alongside the happier ones? Am I clinging to some resentments and grudges? Maybe a loss or some self-pity? Or have I let my heart be refreshed with forgiveness, healing, and acceptance; with the comfort of consoling memories?

In the past year did my heart enlarge to accommodate what came my way; peace and pain alike? Did my heart expand to welcome joy when it came and God's gentle touch upon my hurt and loss?

Did I turn to God for God's strength when I was weak; for God's counsel in my doubt; for God's wisdom in my confusion; for God's companionship in my loneliness? Did I stall or isolate in my sadness or open my heart to moving on towards consolation and peace?

With the passing of time, Mary held in her heart not only joyful memories of a newborn and shepherds and angels, of a star and the magi, but she also made room for the painful memories of Jesus' suffering and death and loss.

So it is with us, too. Our hearts are the memory banks of all that has shaped us and made us the persons we've become and are becoming.

This New Year might be a good time for us to walk through the chambers of our hearts and, with God's help, to let go of what might better be left behind as a new year begins.

For sure, the year ahead will find its own share of blessings and sorrows filling our hearts, but with Jesus' help we can come to accept and even treasure them all and find His healing peace in good times and hard times alike.

Every time we come to the Lord's Table we keep the memory of Christ's incarnation, and we keep the memory of His suffering, death and resurrection.

We remember the One who suffered for us and who fills our hearts with the joy of His presence in one another as we join in worship.

Perhaps in this new year it's time to consider doing something new, like sing in the choir. We're a friendly bunch. We'd love to see our numbers grow. Even if you can't commit to every Sunday, how about every other Sunday or some other variation? Consider it. Reflect on it.

Pray that in the New Year we, like Mary, will keep and treasure our memories of burdens carried and blessings received and in them, and in Jesus Christ, find our peace. Amen!


News from the Fellowship Team

News from the Stewardship Team

Finance Update:

As we write this page of the Belltower it is still mid December, so we cannot yet share with you the full results of 2023. But here is how things stand as of right now:

- Giving for 2023 through November was very close to what we expected, only \$1,118 behind our plan through November. Thank you all for working so hard to fulfill your 2023 pledges!
- Initial indications for 2024 are not as rosy. The total dollars pledged for 2024 (as of mid-December) are \$90,692. That is over \$20,000 less than in 2023.
- The first draft of the budget indicates that we may be looking at a \$24,000 income deficit in 2024.
- The budget will be constructed and approved during the first half of January and will be presented to the congregation after worship on February 4, 2024.

2023 Property Recap:

As usual, it was another busy year maintaining the church properties. Here are some of the highlights of the things that were accomplished this year:

- Paint and repairs for the steeple
- New LED steeple lights installed
- Replaced carpet in narthex and stretched carpet in sanctuary
- Power washed parsonage and church front
- Repaired the parsonage well and added a UV light filtration system and arsenic filtration system based on water test results
- Cleaned pipes and drains at the parsonage
- Replaced dishwasher for the parsonage
- Many thanks to the Clean Team for their ongoing work keeping the church building clean on the inside!
- We also thank the Gardening Angels for their work making the garden areas look pretty throughout the year!

News from the Stewardship Team, continued...

2024 Denominational Assessment:

Each year we have to pay a per member assessment to the Reformed Church Classis of Delaware-Raritan. This money covers the overhead of the Classis, and helps with things like minister support and loans to Classis churches. You may recall the discussion last year that Classis needs to raise the amount of the assessment significantly to fully balance their budget. As membership among ALL Classis churches declines, the per member cost continues to rise. The actual per member number to balance the Classis budget is currently at \$163.44! There was a lot of push back from the member churches last year and a larger discussion has begun about how to assess churches and how to stop the decline in membership. For 2024, Classis decided to keep the assessment at \$100 per member while the larger discussion continues. For Clover Hill, that means we owe the Classis \$7100 in 2024. Some church members choose to make an extra offering to cover the cost of their assessment (or even a part of that cost). If you would like to do this, just mark your check "assessment" and it will be used to help pay what we owe to Classis.



Message from the Pastoral Care Team

Join us January 28 after worship to learn about resources that help with End of Life issues.



This month, the Pastoral Care Team would like to provide resources for our congregation that assist with end of life topics. Advanced Directives/living wills, hospice care and caregiving will be discussed.



We know we would all rather not talk about this. It's sad and uncomfortable.

We know how much we love one another in our community of faith. We think that together we can provide a loving, safe environment to explore some issues that are often difficult to talk about with our family. We'd like to give it a try!

We have two wonderful resources:

- •The first is called "Five Wishes." It is an advanced planning guide for families. We like it because:
 - * It's written in everyday language, making it easy to understand and complete.
 - * It covers personal, spiritual, medical and legal wishes all in one document.
 - * It allows your family or caregiver to know exactly what you want, so they don't have to guess
 - * It's legally valid in NJ to serve as an advanced directive/living will.
- The second resource is called <u>The NokBox</u>, short for "next of kin" box. "The Nokbox is a complete system that helps you organize all of your accounts, possessions, social media presence, communities, kids, pets, personal history, and estate plans (even if you don't have estate plans yet!). It's an estate planning tool AND a home organization system: if you have a household, you need a Nokbox."
