To our Clover Hill family,

We began our February Consistory meeting with these words from Paul to the church in Rome:

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. I myself feel confident about you, my brothers and sisters, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge, and able to instruct one another. Romans 15:13-14

For years, (wow, time flies) we have been relying on dedicated members of our Clover Hill family, serving together on our teams. The addition of our Pastoral Care Team completes us, addressing a critical part of our life as a church family that had long needed attention. And the essence of Clover Hill as a friendly, warm, comfortable and welcoming church family goes on.

We do not have all of the answers. We may not even know what all of the questions are. But we do know that we go into the future together. For now, we will continue, together, to BE the Church, and we will look forward, in hope, to what is to come.

Message from the Pastoral Search Team

Search Team Update:

"With God, there's always an appointed time for things, and when you put Him first, trust in His timing, and keep the faith, miracles happen!"

The Search Team is constantly reminding ourselves of God's Timing. The quote above helps motivate us to continue to be diligent in our approach to find the right pastor for our Church.

Although more work is needed before a potential candidate is recommended by the Search Team, we did have some positive reactions from a recent interview and we will conduct a second interview during the upcoming month.

We continue to ask for your prayers and patience as we move forward with the tasks ahead.

In the meantime, Number 6 of the "Seven C's" from the Book "The Calling of a Part-Time Pastor is "Competence" (page 88).

As a shepherd for your church, you should require your pastor to be dedicated to some form of heed, feed, lead and need model for pastoral ministry. This being said, these words that I use to describe pastoral ministry are not the main point; the mind-set and activities that they portray are what is essential. As you interview a pastoral candidate, they should not be expected to recite this group of words. But what they should be expected to do is tell you what is important to them as a pastor in each of these areas.

I urge church leaders to inquire about a potential pastor's intention to know and love your congregation and community and how they plan to go about this. Also, do they rely upon prayer and the Word of God to guide their ministry? Do they cherish the Bible and are they dedicated to preaching the whole counsel of God? Do they offer personal counsel from the Word of God? You get the idea.

What is at stake, of course, is the spiritual care of your congregation and the health of your church. I believe, any person worthy of the title of "pastor" will not only welcome such a conversation, but will be greatly attracted to a church who engages them in a deep discussion about these important matters.

Titus 3:4 But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, 5 he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, 6 whom he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, 7 so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

Spiritual Spring Cleaning

Lent is a time when Christians around the world prepare their hearts for Easter. Spring is a season of growth, cleansing, and renewal. The juxtaposition of Lent and Easter is not a coincidence. So, dear friends, it is time to do a little spiritual housekeeping.

First it is time to purge. What things hidden in your basements, closets, and garages are no longer useful to you or your household? Just as you donate, recycle, upcycle, or dispose of those items that no longer give you pleasure, think of the distractions in your life that are not pleasing to God. The website, <u>outuponthewaters.com</u> suggest 25 things to give up during this Lenten season:

- screen time
- gossip
- complaining
- self-criticism
- pride
- worry
- interrupting people
- talking about yourself: only talk about yourself when asked a direct question
- shopping: only buy the essentials (like food and cleaning supplies)
- fast food: donate the money you save to a ministry or a charity
- social media
- driving: walk or ride a bike instead
- television
- Netflix
- meat
- single use plastic
- all plastic
- sleeping in/staying up late: spend that time with God instead
- make-up
- the mirror
- weighing yourself
- YouTube
- games on your phone
- Busyness
- talking first: listen more and ask more questions

Giving up 25 things is a tall order and I suspect God would think so too. Focus on a couple of things that are most pertinent to your spiritual growth.

Message from the Pastoral Care Team, continued...

What things can be added to your house to make it a home? Just as you consider what you will contribute to create a feeling of warmth and hospitality, think about something you can take on in your life that will help you grow as a Christian. <u>Outuponthewaters.com</u> suggests several ideas:

- Start a gratitude journal.
- Start a prayer journal.
- Throw away (or donate) 40 things for 40 days.
- Clean your house. Donate things you don't need that could benefit others.
- Declutter.
- Start walking. Spend 20 minutes in silence with God each morning
- Carve out time for Bible study.
- Carve out time for prayer. Pick up a 40 day devotional.
- Be more charitable.
- Donate your time.
- Donate your money.
- Compliment someone every day.
- Make something and give it away. An afghan, or some cookies, or whatever else you are gifted at making.
- Read a book. Visit the Chris Kanach Memorial Library in the NFH
- Adopt a child through an organization like World Vision or Compassion Canada.
- Bring someone a meal. The "I Can Do That" list continues to address needs within our congregation.
- Write a letter to someone.
- Try a creative prayer practice.
- Don't look at your phone for an hour after you wake up and an hour before you go to bed. Pick up a book or your Bible instead.

Try one or two suggestions and make them lifelong habits. Honor God this Lenten season. Have a happy Spring and a blessed Easter. (Submitted by Ann Cucchiara)

The Depths of Renewal

Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son. This is the verdict: Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil. Everyone who does evil hates the light, and will not come into the light for fear that their deeds will be exposed. But whoever lives by the truth comes into the light, so that it may be seen plainly that what they have done has been done in the sight of God.

—JOHN 3:14-21 (NIV)



Renewal often begins in the depths. A seed covered with soil waits for the warmth of spring to bring it to life. Then, shoots burst through the seed's hard shell and stretch up toward the sun, growing into something astonishingly huge, unrecognizable from a seedly point of view. The seed could never have imagined the plant it would become. And so too with us. We don't have the power of regeneration. But God does. Jesus came to reveal it through his last days on earth—his death on the cross, his burial, in the long, dark silence of the tomb, and then, the resurrection. As the shock of radical new life coursed through his body, Jesus stood and walked the earth,

so his friends could see him and know that all he had told them was true. Yes, there was a cross and a death, and an unbearable waiting they endured in the depths of seeming defeat. But then, a raised-to-life, victorious Jesus just as he had promised. What kind of love is this? A love that is stronger than death. One that comes not to condemn, but to renew. A love that shines truth on what needs to change, both within us and around us, and invites us to move forward, arm-in-arm.

God, help me listen With my whole self,


for what you can do with this whole day. Help me listen deeply each moment and start fresh over and over in the light of your rejuvenating word.

These actions are not items on the Lenten "things to do list". They are actions for a life of serving God.

They do not end after Easter Sunday nor begin on next Ash Wednesday.

Keep praying and working at it all.





Fast from busyness.

Take a slow walk around a neighborhood park or other natural place. Listen to the sounds around you-of nature, of people, of silence-and let your soul find rest in the moment.

Fast from emotional exhaustion.

When feeling a soul-draining emotion, such as resentment, hurt, anger, or fear, give yourself time and space to let it rise and then subside. Don't judge, bury, or ignore it, but let it play itself out before choosing a way to respond.


Fast from negativity.

Pay attention to times when you find yourself indulging in skepticism or sarcasm, cynicism or contempt. Make a conscious effort to turn your thoughts around to something positive, hopeful, and life-enhancing.


Fast from verbal violence.

Look for ways to replace hurtful words with healing ones. Be mindful of abstaining from television shows, films, books, articles, and other forms of media that are filled with hateful, judgemental, or cruel words, images, and actions.

*This, rather, is the fasting that I wish: releasing those bound unjustly, untying the thongs of the yoke; Setting free the oppressed, breaking every yoke; Sharing your bread with the hungry, sheltering the oppressed and the homeless; Clothing the naked when you see them, and not turning your back on your own."



- Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
- Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
- Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
- · Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
- Fast from worries and have trust in God.
- Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.
- · Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
- Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with joy.
- Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
- · Fast from grudges and be reconciled.







Often in my life I've heard people say that God hasn't answered their prayer. I'd like to remind each of us that sometimes what is really happening is that God is not giving us the answer that we want.

Nonetheless, here's what I think is good to do when God is silent. In the gospels of Mark and Matthew, a woman comes to Jesus begging that He heal her daughter who is tormented by a demon. She wants something good, but Jesus is silent. We hear the apostles tell Jesus, "Send her away. She keeps calling out after us." AKA she's being annoying. And then what happens? Eventually her perseverance pays off. Jesus gives her what she wants. It's easy to think of this story as the exception. Like Jesus gave her what she wanted because it was a unique circumstance. Maybe He was just in a great mood. It was a one-time thing. Maybe we imagine Him telling the woman, "Hey, I'll help you this time but, you can't just keep coming to me for everything." But if that was the case, Jesus wouldn't have let this story make it into scripture. He would have kept it under wraps. But the secret's out and I don't think it was an accident. You know what I think. I think Jesus likes being bothered.

I remember when I was a high school teacher and campus minister at St. Pius X high school in Piscataway, a student asked about our campus ministry team being the host for a diocesan youth ministry day event. Since the event was going to be at St. Pius it made sense for us to be the host team, which involved directing people to places within the school, getting materials together for the event, etc. We had a number of meetings with the team members to plan what materials were needed, what food would be available, what items would be available, etc. We all managed to adjust our schedules a few times to get everything planned. The student who asked about this project often apologized for taking my time. I was glad to give the time. I liked the student and her idea. So, asking me to help wasn't annoying. In fact, I kind of wanted her and the rest of the team to bother me.

One of my favorite spiritual thoughts is: Jesus doesn't just love you; He likes you. Maybe Jesus was silent while the woman spoke because He just enjoyed listening to her talk. Maybe He liked hearing her call Him Lord. Maybe He cherished the moments He spent with her. Maybe Jesus wants us to read this story and do what she did. He loves you. He savors the sound of your voice. If you're praying for something good right now, and Jesus is being silent, have faith and don't stop bothering Him. I think He likes it.

I keep asking Jesus to convince some other congregants to join the choir. Jesus has been silent, but I'm not going to stop bothering Him!!! Oh, and by the way, I'm not going to stop asking at the end of each of the pieces I submit for the Belltower for people to consider joining the choir, even if it's a minimal commitment! Sunday rehearsal at 9:00 and Worship at 10:00. Come try it out!!!

May Christ Jesus be praised in everything we say, sing, and do.
