Dear Clover Hill,

This fall season has been and will continue to be filled with a series of "theological reflections." A theological reflection is any reflection that seeks to understand God as we encounter our everyday life. Our Methodist brothers and sisters have a unique model for theological reflection. It's called the "Wesleyan Quadrilateral."



Wesley believed that the living core of the Christian faith was revealed in Scripture, illumined by tradition, vivified in personal experience, and confirmed by reason.

These past two weeks, several folks have gathered for this kind of discussion as they reflected on: Night by Elie Wiesel and "Recitatif" by Toni Morrison.

The next two weeks, you're invited to join us as we continue more theological reflection of: "Tenth of December" by George Saunders and the Book of Job.

The third and fifth Sundays in October, we will host two more theological reflections. These will be around the subjects of gender and sexuality.

Since 1974, the Reformed Church in America (RCA, our denomination) has been in conversation over the "need for expression of pastoral care towards those who are rejected because of their homosexual identity," while also calling for an affirmation of "the Bible's teaching against the practice of homosexuality" and the "study of homosexuality as it relates to the life and work of the church." These questions have continued to resurface over the last 46 years, with various overtures, papers, study teams, and dialogues attempting to answer them. In 2018, the interim general secretary Don Poest shared a critical observation, this conversation has kept us from mission for 47 years.


In 2020, it became clear that the denomination was not going to make a definitive decision regarding gender and sexuality but instead allow churches and each Classis to find their way forward. Since then a new denomination was formed called the Affiliated Reformed Church, and churches who identify as more conservative have been given "grace-filled separation" which means that a church can leave the denomination and maintain their property for a period of time. Two of the member churches in our Classis have left and are now part of the Affiliated Reformed Churches (ARC).

We, at Clover Hill, have not engaged in a conversation yet regarding gender and sexuality. The Consistory and the Search Team believe it would be helpful at this time for us to begin to have this conversation.

I hope you'll join us October 15 and/or 29 for these theological reflections. I hope you'll bring questions and an open loving heart toward one another. If you'd like to think about the subject ahead of time, I encourage you to read this article, the <u>Vision 2020 final report</u> and/or watch this video, <u>For the Bible Tells Me So.</u>

In Pastor Beth's letter above, she speaks about the journey the Reformed Church in America (RCA) has been on regarding gender and sexuality. We, at Clover Hill, have not engaged in this conversation yet. The Consistory and the Search Team think this would be helpful at this time.

All of us come with previous thoughts and experiences regarding gender and sexuality. Many of us have differing ideas and feelings regarding the subjects.

Let's create a safe space to look at scripture together and ask our questions. Let's discern together what we believe and understand as a community of faith.

Note: This is not planned as a two-part series; it is two sessions to give as many people as possible the opportunity to attend one or the other. Anyone wishing to attend both is, of course, welcome to do so. Different questions may be raised and different perspectives presented.

Nominations for Consistory

One of the strengths and signs of the good health of our congregation has been the turnover on Consistory. On its face, this may seem to be a strange and contradictory thing to say. But at Clover Hill, we don't have a small handful of people who have served and "run things" for long periods of time; we have a church family where many members have answered the call to participate in shepherding our congregation. When the ordination and installation of new Consistory members takes place and the members of the Great Consistory (all those who have ever been ordained as elders or deacons) are invited to come forward, it is wonderful to see how many have served in this role.



What does it mean to serve on Consistory? The Book of Church Order states simply that, "A consistory is the governing body of a local church." It goes on to describe the office of the elder or deacon as "one of servanthood and service." A variety of talents, skills and perspectives are needed for us to serve well. In Clover Hill, members are installed for a three year term. Each member coordinates one of the teams and we rely on the teams to do the work to which they have been called. Our monthly meetings are typically 90 minutes. Routine business is approved as part of a consent agenda to ensure that our time is spent discussing matters that require and deserve our attention. Consistory members also handle the tasks associated with weekly worship on a rotating schedule. And members of the Great Consistory step in to help, as needed. Installation is for a defined term; ordination is forever.

Nominating Committee: Nancy Lane (elder) and Michelle Clover (deacon) are the Consistory members serving on the nominating committee. At this time, we are seeking two others from the congregation to join them in identifying members to fill three vacancies on Consistory: one elder to serve a three-year term, one deacon to serve a three year term and one deacon to serve a one year term. We will have a **brief congregational meeting on October 8** to elect members to the nominating committee. (The work of the committee begins on October 8.) And we will have a brief meeting on November 19 to accept nominations. Ordination and installation will take place next year.

Please prayerfully consider whether you may serve on the nominating committee or join the many who are part of the Great Consistory of Clover Hill. To those who already have served, thank you. And if you feel called to "re-up" at this time, welcome back.

A New York Times columnist, Jessica Grose, recently did a series of articles on religion and church affiliation/worship attendance. She writes:

I asked every sociologist I interviewed whether communities created around secular activities outside of houses of worship could give the same level of wraparound support that churches, temples and mosques are able to offer. Nearly across the board, the answer was no.

Phil Zuckerman, a professor of sociology and secular studies at Pitzer College, put it this way: "I can go play soccer on a Sunday morning and hang out with people from different races and different class backgrounds, and we can bond. But I'm not doing that with my grandparents and my grandchildren." A soccer team can't provide spiritual solace in the face of death, it probably doesn't have a weekly charitable call and there's no sense of connection to a heritage that goes back generations. You can get bits and pieces of these disparate qualities elsewhere, he said, but there's no "one-stop shop" — at least not right now.

Message from the Pastoral Search Team

Search Team Update:

With the Lord, a day is like a thousand years and a thousand years is like a day. The Lord is not slow in keeping His promise, as some understand slowness.

Summer has come to a close. Some of us look back and think, where did the time go? Others see a respite from cramming so much activity into so short a time. In the past, as teachers, we had little choice but to spend the bulk of family-time in our car. Trips, long or short, surely ended in fun. But, countless hours and miles passed in close quarters, always accompanied by the back seat chorale's rendition of "Are we there yet? How much longer?" Our cry for patience mixed the girls' favorite TV show with their naive grasp of real time: "Just two more Barneys . . . One Barney more!" The gambit usually worked.

We at Clover Hill now find ourselves two years into our pastoral search journey, looking forward to success on the horizon. Are we there yet? Short answer: NO. But we have made significant progress on our trek. Perhaps a map of the Search Committee's itinerary can refresh and recharge us on our way.

The Committee has successfully:

- Familiarized themselves with the RCA's requirements and guides for a pastoral search
- Surveyed the congregation, twice, to determine how we view ourselves, our strengths, values, and goals
- Wrote a self-study, a mission statement, and our church profile for review by Consistory, Committees, Classis, and candidates
- Read and discussed, intensively, The Calling of a Part-Time Pastor
- Created an effective question list for candidate interviews
- Advertised for candidates and reviewed applicants' profiles
- Began interviews of viable candidates
- Re-examined chapter 5 of <u>Part-Time Pastor</u>, "Mutual Expectations"
- Encountered and discussed broader issues relevant to Christian church life

Are we there yet? No. Yet, let's take encouragement from our steady progress. We don't know the length of God's "Barneys", but we can make use of every day awaiting His guidance. Stay involved. Come participate in Pastor Beth's theological reflection sessions in October. Join upcoming opportunities for worship and study and conversation as we are guided to our destination in God's time.

But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Updates from The Stewardship Team:

- Carpet: The carpet work has been completed! Flemington Department store stretched the carpet and removed all of the ripples from the sanctuary and upper meeting room. They also installed new carpet on the stairs to NFH and durable carpet squares in the Narthex. Total cost came in just under \$4,000. Many thanks to all of those who helped move furniture and items off of the carpet and then back again!
- Parsonage: We have had some issues with the well and the pipes in the parsonage. Work has been done on the well and we have a plumber coming in to do work on the pipes and drains in the house. Thank you to Pastor Beth and Jameel for their patience as we work through this problem!
- **Stewardship Campaign:** The theme for this year's Stewardship Campaign will be "Be Thou My Vision, Oh Lord of My Heart." We will kick off the campaign on October 29 and conclude the campaign with pledge dedication Sunday on November 12. On that last Sunday of the campaign, we will also gather for a pot luck brunch after church (information on the following page). As in the past few years, we will ask you to prayerfully consider what you might be able to give in 2024 and share that on a confidential pledge card. Having this information is crucial to building an accurate budget and keeping our expenses in line with our income. Pledge card information will be sent out later in October.
- **Future Projects:** We plan to have a brainstorming session when we gather for the pot luck brunch on November 12. We want to share and hear ideas about future projects for the church and parsonage. And we want to hear ideas about future mission projects that reach beyond Clover Hill.

SELF-CARE FOR CAREGIVERS

Last month we talked about the seven kinds of rest that people need to lead a healthy and productive life. This month, our focus is on self-care for caregivers. Being a caregiver to a loved one can seem truly overwhelming at times. For that reason, it is even more imperative that caregivers have opportunities for rest. The tendency is for caregivers to focus on their loved one so much that they neglect themselves in the process. Though it is not always possible to find a way to get away for a vacation, there are meaningful ways in which a caregiver can find "rest".

"For I know the plans I have for you", <u>declares the Lord</u>, "plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

Sources say that the caregiver must practice <u>self-compassion</u> without feeling guilty. Constant, ongoing stress can lead to multiple health and emotional difficulties, which can diminish the ability to care for someone else.

Practice deep-breathing techniques, yoga, or meditation. A simple breath awareness activity or a few yoga moves can take less than 5 minutes but offer a sense of restoration.

Stay socially connected. Simply picking up the phone and calling a friend from timeto-time can give the caregiver a sense of connectedness. Invite a friend over for a cup of tea. Facetime a former colleague or relative. Join an online book club.

Pick up the Bible and read favorite passages or post meaningful scripture in a prominent place. (See "Cut and Post Activity" on the next page.)

Make eating well and getting enough sleep a priority. Pray about it.

Made For The Harvest, Jesus' Parables (Mark 4:3-20)

Happy Autumn- the leaves are changing, the temperatures are dropping and the combine harvesters are humming. It is harvest time. Mark 4 has some parables seen in other gospels: the sower (4:3-20), the lamp (4:21-23), and the mustard seed (4:30-33). Jesus adds a different kingdom parable – a story of the growth of a seed. During this Autumn season of change, we will look at the meaning of the seed parable and changes needed in our spiritual lives.



Most of Jesus' contemporaries were familiar with sowing seeds and harvesting crops. Thus, Jesus used agriculture in His parables. Although not all being farm-

ers ourselves, worshipping at Clover Hill with its view of the green harvested fields along Amwell Road, perhaps helps us relate to these parables. Yet, I wonder if some hearers were confused, curious why Jesus spoke of seeds and fields and trees and harvest, but not about serving God, our hope, and God's word. Of course, He did speak on all of these things, but some may not have understood. In fact, even His own disciples at times did not understand (Mark 4:10-13).

When Jesus spoke in parables, they were sometimes confusing and difficult to put into relatable terms. However, in the case of the Parable of the Sower (also known as the Parable of the Four Soils), understanding the meaning is easier.

Jesus directly explained the meaning in the Gospels, so there's no guessing as to what He meant.

But still, how do we apply the Parable of the Four Soils to Christian life today? What type of soil are you? It's in the self-assessment of these questions that we have the opportunity to make transformative change in our lives.


I need to be ready to learn the teachings of Jesus (Matthew 13:1-23)



From "Sweet Caroline" to "We Will Rock You," raucous crowds of thousands never have any hesitancy about singing along at sporting events. When it comes to Worship, however, it can be hard for a music minister to lift every voice. Everyone has their own preferences when it comes to music and some people just aren't drawn to singing, but music at Worship is more than just music. It's a Christian exercise in prayer.

I think it's important that the music contain a beautiful expression of prayer. This is not to say that the music itself must be beautiful, but rather the beauty is found in the expression of the prayer. Like most aspects of our faith, it's the intention that matters most. If one intends on raising one's voice to sing glory to God, the song becomes beautiful in its own right.

We're called as Christians to bear witness to Jesus Christ, to participate in the Worship of God, and to be in communion with one another. Singing in one voice with our community fosters unity and brings us closer to God. It harkens back to the direction of Jesus when He said, "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

Sacred music is the language of prayer. It merges beautiful melodies, symbolic of prayer, often with the words of scripture. St. Augustine goes so far as to suggest that, "If there be praise, and it be not of God, it is no hymn: if there be praise, and God's praise, and it be not sung, it is no hymn. It needs then, if it be a hymn, have these three things, both praise, and that of God, and singing" (from Augustine's Exposition on Psalm 73). St. Augustine was not just trying to get the whole congregation singing. He was explaining that the value of music was so deep that adding it to prayerful words makes the prayer even more powerful.

We can clearly see the value of singing at Worship and what it can add to a prayer, but these can be small comforts to unconfident singers as the new hymn approaches. Fear not, for I have some tips to make your Worship-singing experience less stressful and hopefully more pleasurable.

What if I don't know the song and can't read music?

Learning hymns is a common problem. Maybe you feel like Mr. Bean in his famous "Hallelujah" skit. Check out the link. It's worth the watch!! https://youtu.be/Y mz1Uqjaog?si=XkfZoI7D9zI7zQQu

In the scene Mr. Bean hums along with "All Creatures of Our God and King," only to loudly sing at the "Alleluia" sections. The skit is funny because it's a real-to-life scenario that many of us have faced. If you don't know all the words to a hymn, no one will deduct points from your performance for only singing what you know. You go to Worship with the intention of singing and every little bit that you can contribute to the prayer counts.

What if I don't like my own singing voice?

Whether you have a voice that's meant for American Idol or not, your voice was placed in this world by our Creator. Singing at Worship is not a matter of pride, but a chance to lay ourselves bare to Jesus Christ. Once this is understood, it actually takes a lot of the pressure off.

What if I just don't like singing?

Some people just plain don't like to sing. There's nothing wrong with this. I would say, it's wise to acknowledge that this is your cross to bear. This is a chance for you to take an uncomfortable moment and, as your mother may have instructed you, "Kiss it up to God."

God made every voice and He wants to hear them all; the good, the bad, and even the ugly.
